This year (2021) the river managed to sustain a small flow as far as the Ibuguziwa Bridge till early November. However it was completely dry until 20th of January 2022. The fact that the river trickled along from October through to early November surprised me as rainfall was much lower than last year.

The heavy rain we had in 2019/2020, filled up the water-tables and springs so the rainfall we enjoyed in 2020/21 was able to top up what was already there.

This increase to underground water levels has helped to maintain water flows in rivers this year. Perhaps, also, this higher rainfall in 2019/2020 helped fill up the Ihefu, which in turn has assisted this years more sustained flow despite the lower rainfall. It is also possible, (something that I would love to hear) that this is from the improvement in the Ihefu wetland itself. Since, the vast herds of cattle were removed in 2008, and made part of RNP, I understand that the swamp has begun to restore some of its important, spongy properties. (due to regeneration of the swamp itself.)

**However, I will continue to repeat what I have been saying since 1995:-
If we do not curtail the illegal abstraction of water in the catchment area
during the wet and dry seasons, Ruaha National Park will not survive.**
